


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#### **VAFP MISSION STATEMENT**

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### VAFP PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

David S. Gregory, MD, FAAFP



Two major things to share: "Choose Virginia" is back, and our Virginia delegations visit to Washington.

With joy and hope, the "Choose Virginia" event was held again on May 20th in Richmond for the first time in years, with energetic and broad attendance. We had over forty-five students from all Virginia medical schools, with over twenty-five residents and faculty, representing nine of our Virginia Family Medicine Programs. Being the first year back doing so, we learned key lessons for next year to be even more of a success, but the benefit of the investment in this recruitment effort for our specialty and for Virginia's future primary care was obvious. Thank you to all who came and contributed. Well done!

On a more mixed and pensive note, this year has not been one of my easiest. Sure, there have been challenges in my leadership role, but I am talking about the unexpected challenges of my year - those that I have had no cause in. no influence over, but still had to deal with the outcome. Without going too into detail, a big part of these challenges has been that my mother, mother-in-law, most significant career mentor's wife and even my family's dog, have all passed away these past few months. These losses remind me of the process of true personal grieving, and as I was recently able to be at the Capital in late May for the AAFP "Family Medicine Advocacy Summit," I reflected upon how this grieving process is remarkably like how many deal

with challenges to our specialty.

Name the challenge of a "new reality," a minor one or a big one in our specialty – an example being using EMR's in our clinics - each of us has:

- Denied it initially accommodate or adjust to that challenge and find work arounds. We continue to function for a period, surviving moment to moment, avoiding change to the new reality. We "kick the can down the road" until we have the bandwidth to deal with the emotions of the new situation.
- Gotten angry As we begin to deal with that challenge, denial gives way to dismay, disappointment and anger to the unbelievable state of the new inalterable reality.
- Bargained for a different reality
   For those with the sense of
  control that we could find a
  different new reality, we begin
  offering solutions, frequently
  unachievable, unrealistic, or
  magical, in hopes that the new
  reality will just go away.
- Flirted with depression As those solutions show to be ineffective, we confirm our feeling of powerlessness to alter the new reality, depersonalizing the issue, lose hope, burnout or begin to have depressed feelings.
- Eventually accept the new reality realizing the change is inalterable and we have to move on.

Advocacy is a way of proactively fortifying ourselves against the risks of change, having influence over these risks, reducing the regret that comes when

change may not go our way and building realistic (not magical or unrealistic) options before the loss occurs. In this way, advocacy is like being a very pragmatic physician trying to help a patient with an uncurable medical problem, meeting frequently to build a trusting relationship, using the relationship to develop shared models for change, understanding what is realistically able to be achieved and having no regret that through the advocacy, we did our best to create a realistic new reality.

In Washington, this year, the major themes we advocated for included:

- Reduced administrative burden by requiring standardized and transparent prior authorization requirements for Medicare Advantage and commercial insurances.
- Increased financial support of primary care, by closing the gap between mandated increases in reimbursement for hospital, nursing home and outpatient surgical services over time versus reimbursements for outpatient primary care that have remained flat for 20 years.
- Supporting sustained funding for a newer funding stream for Family Medicine residency training that is less hospitalcentric, and more outpatient and community linked – called Teaching Health Center Graduate Medical Education

(THC-GME) – shown to double retention of residency graduates from residency programs into the communities in which they train. Sustained funding allows programs to grow in a realistic manner without risk of funding loss

- that has caused most states, like Virginia, to not seek this concept without assurances of success.
- A study of whether present hospital centered residency funding \$16
   billion of annual federal spending is meeting the healthcare needs of the country. There has been no audit on this spending in over

50 years of this spending, and although primary care accounts for over 50 percent of the health care, Family Medicine has historically received less than 5% of this funding.


Each of these asks were bipartisan, win-win, and either budget neutral or low budget. Virginia's delegation was among the largest, meeting with the staff of both of our Senators and US representatives of all delegation members. We went together (not alone) without denial of our reality (instead sharing real life stories), having impassioned (not angry) hearts, offering realistic and achievable (not magical) options, with a sense of hope (not depression), and accepting the viewpoints of those we spoke, as well as the outcomes that may occur, but without regret because we shared our voice.

I encourage each of you to fortify yourself against the grief of loss related to our specialty. Advocacy is that vehicle and your voice is very influential. Contact your State Delegate and Senator to offer your experience and perspectives. Develop a relationship over time with them and other representatives near by to be the voice of reason that our specialty has historically been. We cannot afford our voice to be small, distracting or overlooked. Get involved through our own "FP of the Day" program, VAFP Advocacy Day, Speak Out and Key Contact initiatives. You do not have to grieve change but can influence it.

You do not have to be alone with all the challenges in our specialty, and we can be together soon.

With pride and hope, I look forward to seeing you soon at our Annual Meeting in Virginia Beach this July.

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




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# VAFP LEADERS ATTEND THE AAFP'S ANNUAL CHAPTER LEADERSHIP FORUM AND NATIONAL CONFERENCE OF CONSTITUENCY LEADERS

Over 400 family physicians met in Kansas City May 8-11 for the AAFP's Annual Chapter Leadership Forum (ACLF) and the National Conference of Constituency Leaders (NCCL). Members from across the Commonwealth represented the VAFP at ACLF and NCCL.

VAFP President David Gregory, MD, FAAFP, VAFP President-Elect Denee Moore, MD, FAAFP, VAFP First Vice President Tim Yu, MD, FAAFP, and VAFP Secretary Robin Anderson, MD, FAAFP attended ACLF. ACLF is the AAFP's leadership development program for chapter-elected leaders, aspiring chapter leaders, and chapter staff. Among other roles, ACLF functions as an orientation for emerging leaders who serve on chapter boards, as well as professional development for new and seasoned chapter staff. Drawing hundreds of chapter leaders each year, ACLF features targeted breakout sessions on chapter governance, advocacy, communication and much more.

VAFP members Macy Rupprecht, DO (Woman), Nader Silver, MD (LBTQ +), Linwood Joyner, MD (Minority), Kara Foster-Weiss, MD (IMG), and Tabatha Davis, MD (New Physician) attended NCCL to represent the VAFP. NCCL is the AAFP's leadership and policy development event for underrepresented constituencies. NCCL serves as a platform for different perspectives and concerns of AAFP members to help bring about change. The five constituencies with representation include: Women, Minorities, New Physicians (in the first seven years of practice following residency), International Medical Graduates (IMG), from schools outside the U.S., Canada, and Puerto Rico and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Questioning (LGBTQ+) physicians or physician allies. At NCCL, physicians develop skills to advocate for issues that are relevant to specific constituencies, practices, the specialty, and patients.

On May 8<sup>th</sup>, the attendees of NCCL and ACLF were invited to attend the Gender and Negotiation dinner and workshop. On May 9<sup>th</sup>, an opening session with AAFP's senior leadership provided updates on the Academy and addressed current issues of critical importance.

Following the opening session, the ACLF delegation attended sessions focused on Board Leadership, Member Engagement, Implicit Bias, Communications, Education and much more. The NCCL constituency delegates attended their opening plenary titled, "Joy as Revolution: On



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Leadership, Intersectionality and the Profound Freeing Altruism of Choosing Oneself and then divided out into working groups and drafted resolutions to forward to the reference committees including advocacy, education, health of the public and science, organization and finance, and practice enhancement.

Delegates to NCCL worked through the business of the meeting discussing resolutions that were presented to the reference committees focused on a wide variety of topics including administrative burden (credentialling, prior auth, coordination of care), DEI issues, transgender care, social determinants of health, workforce and pathway issues, payment reform and much more.

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
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#### VAFP Hosts Choose Virginia 2023 in Richmond

On May 20<sup>th</sup> the VAFP hosted Choose Virginia 2023 at the Delta Hotels by Marriott Richmond Downtown. This event was first held back in 2009 in partnership with the Virginia Workforce Development Authority and the Virginia Department of Health. In the fall of 2022, VAFP was contacted by some of the Commonwealth's Family Medicine Residency Program Directors to again sponsor and host a Choose Virginia event. "Choose Virginia" Scholarships for Graduating Medical Students and Family Medicine Residents

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians (VAFP) Foundation is delighted to offer a medical student scholarship and a resident scholarship for assistance with education loan repayment. Many medical students and family medicine residents in Virginia have expressed an interest in staying in Virginia after their graduation to complete a family medicine residency or to practice in a medically underserved area. Over the past two years the VAFP Foundation has received donations to support this effort to keep our own.

This year the Foundation will offer one graduating Virginia medical student a \$1,500 scholarship. The successful candidate will meet the following criteria:

- Graduating Virginia medical student in good academic standing.
- Entering a Virginia family medicine residency program. A letter from the program director is required.
- Will have completed the PGY-1 year successfully and be entering into the PGY-2 year at that program. A letter from the program director is required in order to receive the scholarship check for loan repayment at that time.
- Must submit a 250-500 word letter explaining why he/she wants to practice family medicine in Virginia as a resident and as a family physician.

In addition, we are offering one \$2,000 scholarship for a graduating PGY-3 Virginia family medicine resident who wishes to practice in an underserved area of Virginia. The requirements for this scholarship are as follows:

- Graduating as a PGY-3 Virginia family medicine resident
- Have an up-to-date Virginia medical license.
- Practicing family medicine in an underserved medical area after graduation as designated by United States Human Resource Service Administration (HRSA) and/or Virginia Department of Health. A letter verifying this is required.

- Must submit a 250-500-word letter explaining why they he/she wants to practice in an underserved area of Virginia.
- Practicing at the underserved site for one year.

  Documentation is necessary to receive the scholarship check for loan repayment after one year of practice in an underserved area.





### VIRGINIA DELEGATION MAKES A STRONG SHOWING AT FMAS

On Monday morning, May 22, 2023, over 276 Family Physicians gathered, with 93 of them being residents and students. This was more than double the number of last year's conference, and I am proud to say that the majority of resident members from the Virginia delegation were from the Lynchburg Family Medicine Residency.

After being welcomed by the AAFP's current president, Dr. Tochi Iroku-Malize MD, we were treated to an awe-inspiring speech by Admiral Rachel Levine MD, who serves as the 17th Assistant Secretary for Health for the US Department of Health and Human Services. Not only is her resume impressive, but the work she has done for children as a board-certified pediatrician, focusing on the intersection of mental and physical health, as well as all Americans during her appointment is simply stunning.

Admiral Levine was certainly a tough act to follow, however follow it we did, with break out groups. Having done Advocacy 101 last year, I decided to attend "Recruiting Future Advocates" with Drs. David Gregory MD (VAFP President) and Bobbie Sperry MD. Here, we heard from Dr. Rick Madden MD about his efforts to expand advocacy in New Mexico. Kathy Pabst, Executive Director from the Missouri Academy of Family Physicians, also detailed out a syllabus for implementing an advocacy curriculum in residency programssomething that I intend to follow up on.

The rest of the day was spent going over policy, being prepped on the bills we would be asking our elected officials and their aides to consider, as well as helpful tips about lobbying and remaining bipartisan. The most important thing that we, as Family Physicians, can do is tell our stories. We are the ones treating patients on the front lines of medicine. We are the ones that are taught how to deliver safe, effective, cost-conscious care. Our job, as advocates, is to take these narratives and make them public.

Finally, it was time to prep our



delegation. This year, there were 13 members of the VAFP delegation, including 3 residents, most of which had never been to an advocacy conference before! We brainstormed our approach, with Dr. Sterling Ransone MD (board chair of the AAFP) and Dr. David Gregory MD taking the lead.

The next day we were sent off to lobby by yet another inspiring speaker, Dr. Yadira Caraveo MD, a pediatrician who serves as the Congressional Representative for the 8th District in Colorado. Armed with our leavebehinds, speaking notes, and a good breakfast, the delegation of Virginia trekked across the Capitol to the House of Representatives offices to meet with the aides for Representatives Ben Cline and Rob Wittman. After those, we walked over to the Senate offices, meeting with the legislative aides of

both Senator Time Kaine and Senator Mark Warner.

Finally, our delegation split into smaller groups for our final meetings. Myself, Dr. Gregory, Dr. Carolyn Seepe MD (Danville), and our two residents (Dr. Nick Battaglia DO and Dr. Harry Ratanpal DO) walked back over to the House offices to meet with the legislative aide for Representative Bob Good, the representative for the 5<sup>th</sup> district of Virginia, our home district. While we were finishing our meeting, Rep. Good happened to be walking back to his office. Without prompting, Drs. Battaglia and Ratanpal launched immediately into conversation with him, talking about their respective experiences attending Liberty University College of Osteopathic Medicine, serving the greater Lynchburg Community, and inviting him to visit

the residency the next time he was in Lynchburg- an invitation that we are hoping he accepts.

This year, the biggest takeaway for me was how receptive all our elected Senators and Representatives were to our talking points. Many of them were co-sponsors or already supportive of the measures we were asking congress to take. While the COVID-19 pandemic has dwindled down, the catastrophic ramifications of a global disaster are still being felt. Seeing the large number of Family Physicians, and the incredible amount of Family Medicine Resident Physicians, as well as medical students, coming to DC to advocate for their patients gives me hope. Watching my residents going from background observers to leading conversation with legislative aides, sharing their stories, and gaining confidence, made me incredibly proud. After all, when it comes to legislation, if you're not at the table, you're likely on the menu.

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#### REFLECTION BY DR. NICK BATTAGLIA, DO

This week was the AAFP Family Medicine Advocacy Symposium (FMAS). I had the privilege to attend this event and represent the 5th district of VA, the state of VA, and resident family physicians throughout our country. This was my first time attending an advocacy event and I was eager to see what I was getting into. The first night included a reception for resident physicians and medical students to meet each other and learn more about what the week would entail. There was also a formal reception hosted by the AAFP for all the attending members. The following day was full of guest speakers, breakout sessions, and strategic planning sessions. It was quite the informative day as a multitude of physicians and legislators gave their perspectives on trying to get support for desired changes. The three main asks/issues the AAFP wanted to bring to Congress this year included reducing the administrative burden on physicians, updating Medicare physician payments to account for inflation, and investing in the primary care workforce. After our planning sessions with the rest of the Virginia delegation, it was back to our rooms for some last-minute studying on important topics and (hopefully) a good night's sleep.

The next day was the big day, going to congress. The day started back at the hotel with a wonderful guest speaker, Dr. Yadira Caraveo MD, a Pediatrician who now represents one of the districts of Colorado in the House. Hearing her story of how she went from treating patients on a local level with medicine, to a state level, and finally a national level through politics was fascinating and inspiring. Then we set off to the House, where we had multiple meetings with representatives for House members from Virginia. After some quick photo ops and sightseeing around Congress, it was inside the Senate buildings for meetings with the legislative aides of the two Virginia senators, Tim Kaine and Mark Warner. It was great to



hear and read that our senators were already quite aware of the issues we were bringing up and in fact had been co-sponsors on some of the bills. The support from the representatives was palpable. My final meeting was with the representative for Bob Good of Virginia's 5<sup>th</sup> district, which is where I reside and work. It was another great meeting where we discussed our three main points that we wanted addressed. On our way out, we happened to run into Bob Good, himself. He walked us back to his office, engaged us in meaningful conversation, and even had time for a quick photo. He was so personable and really hit home how these politicians are often everyday people like us. It truly motivated me to want to come back and become even more involved in advocacy. This was an experience I will never forget, and I hope I can inspire more physicians to pick up the cause next year and for years to come. That is how we will make our careers more sustainable and worthwhile.

#### REFLECTION BY DR. HARRY RATANPAL, DO

As a family medicine (FM) physician, I feel an inherent drive to advocate for my ability to provide effective care. I believe our collective efforts with the AAFP were not only impactful to the staffers and representatives we met but were also personally transformative. It was inspiring to see a conference hall full of 200+ physicians with busy schedules take time out of their daily routine to travel from all over the US to advocate over shared strife. The bill that I felt most strongly about entailed efforts to reduce administrative burden on physicians by streamlining and standardizing prior authorizations and increasing transparency in step therapy requirements (Safe

Step Act-HR 2630). I felt empowered after hearing from my colleagues about their experience with delays in care due to the arbitrary stepwise treatment plans dictated largely by contracts between insurance and pharmaceutical companies. The staffers were very receptive to the concerns of the constituents and at times shared their stories of how therapy dictated by their insurance company negatively impacted them personally. Admittedly, I was emboldened by our collective stance; it was challenging to not tie in my own emotion when detailing a story of my long-term patient with cancer and the delays in obtaining necessary imaging. Prior to this experience, I believed that advocacy for legislation was up to the professional lobbyists who were "in the know" about all the statistics and data. I was happy to learn that this is not the case. As a family physician, I am as qualified as one of those experts to advocate on behalf of other doctors and most importantly the patients we serve.





# AAFP ENDORSES THE STRENGTHENING MEDICARE FOR PATIENTS AND PROVIDERS ACT

#### Why it matters:

Medicare's physician payment system is undermining physicians' ability to provide high-quality, comprehensive care — particularly in primary care. The AAFP applauds Reps. Raul Ruiz (D-Calif.), M.D.; Larry Bucshon (R-Ind.), M.D.; Ami Bera (D-Calif.), M.D.; and Mariannette Miller-Meeks (R-Iowa). M.D.; for their leadership in introducing the Strengthening Medicare for Patients and Providers Act (H.R. 2474). This bill would enact a positive annual update to the Medicare physician fee schedule conversion factor based on the Medicare Economic Index - a top priority for the AAFP and an important step toward building a sustainable Medicare payment system.

#### AAFP RESPONDS TO FTC PROPOSED BAN OF NONCOMPETE CLAUSES

#### Why it matters:

In January, the Federal Trade
Commission (FTC) proposed a new
regulation that would ban noncompete
clauses in employment contracts.
Noncompete clauses are uniquely
challenging to family medicine's
emphasis on longitudinal care and can
be used inappropriately to prevent
physicians from maintaining patient
relationships when they change jobs.
The AAFP has long opposed restrictive
clauses in employment contracts, which
can negatively affect care continuity and
physician wellbeing as well as worsen
health care consolidation.

## AAFP APPLAUDS FINAL PRIOR AUTHORIZATION RULE FROM CMS

#### Why it matters:

The AAFP applauded the 2024 Medicare Advantage final rule from CMS, which includes new policies supported by the AAFP to address prior authorization. This will strengthen coverage requirements and reduce administrative complexity so that physicians can spend more time with patients. These new regulations mark a significant step toward addressing the harms caused by prior authorization.

# AAFP ALARMED BY FEDERAL COURT RULING JEOPARDIZING CARE FOR MILLIONS OF AMERICANS

#### Why it matters:

A federal court's March 30 ruling in Braidwood Management Inc. v. Becerra renders unconstitutional the Affordable Care Act's requirement for insurers and health plans to cover preventive services recommended by the U.S. Preventive Services Task Force, jeopardizing equitable, affordable access to evidence-based preventive services for millions.

The AAFP continues to advocate to ensure that all patients receive equitable and reliable access to preventive services. Research demonstrates that health care systems prioritizing access to primary and preventive care have better patient outcomes and lower health care costs, including decreases in costly hospitalizations and emergency department visits.

# AAFP RECOGNIZES MINORITY HEALTH MONTH AND BLACK MATERNAL HEALTH WEEK

#### Why it matters:

The AAFP consistently advocates for policies that close equity gaps, including inequities in maternal health outcomes. Family physicians play a key role in mitigating health disparities, bias, and discrimination. We are committed to developing strategies that promote health equity through identifying and addressing unmet social needs in all health care delivery systems, with the goal of prioritizing preventive health and management of chronic conditions.

# MATCH DAY 2023 REINFORCES NEED TO INVEST IN PRIMARY CARE WORKFORCE

#### Why it matters:

On the heels of Match 2023, AAFP President Tochi Iroku-Malize, M.D., M.P.H., FAAFP, writes in *Medical Economics* how this year's Match emphasizes the importance of a strong family medicine workforce. This year's Match results offer reason to celebrate, but the U.S. faces pressing workforce and health equity problems: We need more primary care doctors, and we need them practicing in underserved communities where a family physician or primary care doctor is often the only one trained to meet area patients' health care needs.



## FAMILY MEDICINE ADVOCATES VISIT CAPITOL HILL

#### Why it matters:

Nearly 300 family physicians, residents, and medical students travelled to Washington, D.C., for the AAFP's Family Medicine Advocacy Summit. As part of the summit, they met with policymakers to discuss urgent health care issues affecting patients and practices. This included ensuring adequate Medicare physician payment, strengthening the primary care workforce, and easing the administrative burden too many physicians face.

# AMERICA'S LEADING PHYSICIAN GROUPS ADVOCATE FOR ACCESS AND WORKFORCE PRIORITIES

#### Why it matters:

Earlier this month, leaders from the AAFP, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American College of Physicians, the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, the American Psychiatric Association, and the American Osteopathic Association visited Capitol Hill to advocate on behalf of the 600,000 physicians, residents, and medical students they represent.

Leaders engaged with members of Congress and their staffs about the urgent need to bolster the physician workforce, improve Medicare physician payment, and ensure Medicaid coverage for millions of patients.

The VAFP Board of Directors is the governing body of the VAFP and is comprised of physicians across the Commonwealth from many different practice types and geographic regions. The elected Resident and Student Directors are voting members of the Board, funded to attend required meetings, and serve a one-year term beginning in October 2023.

#### Duties/Responsibilities

- Be a member of the VAFP.
- Review meeting agenda and supporting materials prior to each Board meeting.
- Intent to attend the four quarterly VAFP Board of Directors Meetings.
- Attend the AAFP National Conference of Family Medicine Residents and Medical Students in Kansas City, Missouri and serve as the Virginia Delegate.
- Represent the views and interests of residents/students within the Commonwealth.
- Provide brief oral and/or written report at each Board meeting on resident/medical student activities within the Commonwealth.
- Support from program director/medical school for participation.
- Follow-up communications to fellow residents/ students regarding any Board actions that impact residents/students.

#### Nomination/Voting Process

- Each Virginia residency program/medical school may nominate one person to run as a candidate.
- Candidates complete the on-line nomination form that will be distributed to nominated persons in August 2023.
- Submit head shot photo to mschulte@vafp.org no later than September 1, 2023.
- In September, information that includes the name, program and personal statement from each candidate and a ballot will be distributed to each residency program/medical school.
- Each Virginia family medicine residency program/ medical school is entitled to cast one vote each to two nominees out of the total group of nominees.
- The residency program/medical school contact is responsible for querying to determine who will receive the two votes.
- Each residency program/medical school must vote for two candidates for the ballot to be valid, and only one of these votes may go to a resident/student from their program/school if one is nominated.
- Election results will be announced in September 2023.


