It was great seeing many of you at the 2023 Annual Meeting in Virginia Beach. The educational sessions were very informative, there were several opportunities to network with colleagues, and we celebrated the Academy's 75th anniversary. Thank you to the Continuing Medical Education (CME) Committee led by Mitch Miller, MD and the Academy staff for making the meeting a tremendous success.

At the Annual Meeting, I introduced the Academy's pilot of the VAFP Family Medicine Practice
Transformation Grant Initiative. This grant will be available to attending and resident physician members to support a project within their practice that enhances the patient experience or supports the delivery of the highest level of care to patients. More details about the grant are available on the VAFP website and via QR code below, and I encourage members to apply.

The VAFP supports medical student and resident members throughout their educational journey so they will choose Virginia as the ideal location to practice Family Medicine. In November, the Academy will host the annual Scholarly Symposium. This event is held virtually and gives medical students, residents, and fellows the opportunity to present scholarly work relevant to Family Medicine in poster format or as an oral presentation. Attending physician members are invited to attend. Also, the VAFP supports medical student and resident members who desire to pursue Family Medicine leadership at the national level. In July, Allison Smith, a medical student at Liberty University College of Osteopathic Medicine - Center for Medical and Health Sciences in Lynchburg, VA, was elected as Student Chair of the 2024 AAFP National Conference. In this role, Allison will serve as a member of the AAFP Commission on Education (COE), the COE Subcommittee on Resident and Student Issues, and the COE Subcommittee on

National Conference Planning. In addition, she will coordinate and make decisions regarding student activities throughout the year, provide input into planning programming and special activities for the 2024 National Conference, and preside at the business sessions of the 2024 National Congress of Student Members. Congratulations Allison!

The 2024 Virginia General Assembly session starts in January. With the expertise of the VAFP's General Counsel Hunter Jamerson, JD and VAFP Legislative Committee Chair Jesus Lizarzaburu, MD, the Academy is well positioned to advocate for legislation that benefits patients and family physicians. Every legislative session is an opportunity for members to engage with their elected representatives, inform them of the great work we do for our patients and communities, and drive the legislative agenda to enhance patient care and the practice of Family Medicine. Correctly identify and differentiate among pediatric behavioral health problems such as childhood depression, ADHD, bipolar disorder, anxiety states (including PTSD), oppositional and conduct disorders, and psychosis.



Effectively manage psychopharmacology: selecting medications, initiating and tapering dosages, monitoring improvements, and identifying and minimizing medication side effects.



Create and implement a treatment plan by mobilizing existing resources like family members, school personnel, and other professional caregivers.

VIRGINIA ACADEMY OF FAMILY PHYSICIANS 2023 SCHOLARLY SYMPOSIUM

Saturday, November 4, 2023 Virtual

10:00 a.m. – 11:30 a.m. CALL FOR SCHOLARLY ACTIVITY

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians (VAFP) Scholarly Symposium offers Family Medicine Residents, Fellows, and Medical Students the opportunity to present scholarly work in poster format or as an oral presentation.

The submissions must be original work not yet published or presented at regional or national meetings and can either be work in progress or completed.

Submissions from medical students, residents, and fellows are eligible. A one time fee of \$15 is required per person

Guidelines

Scholarly activity may be presented in poster format or as an oral presentation.

• Type of scholarly activity may be clinical or population health research,

- medical education research, literature review, case reports, QI/PI projects, clinical successes, patient stories, or educational projects.
- Topic should be relevant to family medicine/primary care.
- Submissions must be of original work not yet published or presented at regional or national meetings (except institutional symposiums).
- Submission may be a work in progress or completed.
- Collaborative work is welcome.
- Concurrent (2023) submissions to other conferences such as the North American Primary Care Research Group (NAPCRG) and Society of Teachers of Family Medicine (STFM) are encouraged.
- Medical student projects previously presented at medical schools are accepted/encouraged.

Meeting Format

All participants will pre-record their presentations – oral presentations limited

to 5 minutes and poster presentations limited to 2-3 minutes. The preliminary schedule of events will be based on the number of submissions received/selected.

Submissions from each category by registrant type (medical students, residents, and fellows) will be included. The pre-recorded presentations (oral -5 minutes and poster -2-3 minutes) will be followed by a question-and-answer session facilitated by the moderator.

Submission Deadlines:

Submit application including abstract (250 words or less) no later than October 13, 2023.

Submit your prerecorded presentation (voice over PowerPoint file(s) with or without speaker view) no later than October 20, 2023.

Feedback on Submitted Research

All projects will be reviewed and provided written feedback by a minimum of two judges. Review will focus on the following:

- Quality of research/QI methodology and appropriate use
- Validity of conclusions or anticipated results
- Clarity and cohesive message during presentation
- Relevance of and/or impact on family medicine
- Innovation of research or quality improvement
- Organization/understandability of poster/presentation

For presentations and posters in which the above criteria do not apply, reviewers will seek to evaluate the extent to which the submitted presentation is of interest to family physicians.

How to Submit Your Project

If you have multiple submissions, one

application form should be completed for each submission. You are only required to pay the \$15 fee once regardless of the number of submissions.

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians (VAFP) Foundation is delighted to offer a medical student scholarship and a resident scholarship for assistance with education loan repayment. Many medical students and family medicine residents in Virginia have expressed an interest in staying in Virginia after their graduation to complete a family medicine residency or to practice in a medically underserved area. Over the past few years the VAFP Foundation has received donations to support this effort to keep our own.

This year the Foundation will offer one graduating Virginia medical student a \$1,500 scholarship.

- The successful candidate will meet the following criteria: Graduating Virginia medical student in good academic standing
- 2. Entering a Virginia family medicine residency program. A letter from the program director is required.

- 3. Will have completed the PGY-1 year successfully and be entering into the PGY-2 year at that program. A letter from the program director is required in order to receive the scholarship check for loan repayment at that time.
- 4. Must submit a 250-500 word letter explaining why he/she wants to practice family medicine in Virginia as a resident and as a family physician.


In addition, we are offering one \$2,000 scholarship for a graduating PGY-3 Virginia family medicine resident who wishes to practice in an underserved area of Virginia.

- 1. The requirements for this scholarship are as follows: Graduating as a PGY-3 Virginia family medicine resident
- 2. Have an up-to-date Virginia medical license
- 3. Practicing family medicine in an underserved medical area after graduation as designated by United States Human Resource Service Administration (HRSA) and/or Virginia Department of Health. A letter verifying this is required.
- 4. Must submit a 250-500-word letter explaining why they he/she wants to practice in an underserved area of Virginia
- 5. Practicing at the underserved site for one year. Documentation is necessary to receive the scholarship check for loan repayment after one year of practice in an underserved area.

Family Medicine Advocacy Rounds



FAMILY MEDICINE ADVOCACY ROUNDS - ISSUE 14 AND 15, JULY AND AUGUST 2023

Welcome to Family Medicine Advocacy Rounds—the American Academy of Family Physicians' monthly tip sheet to educate, engage, and update you on the latest policy issues affecting family physicians and their patients.

2024 PROPOSED MEDICARE PHYSICIAN FEE SCHEDULE REAFFIRMS NEED FOR SUSTAINABLE PAYMENT SYSTEM

Why it matters: The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services released its 2024 Medicare physician fee schedule (MPFS) proposed rule, which includes proposals to strengthen primary care. However, inadequate Medicare payment rates strain physician practices and create barriers to care for patients enrolled in Medicare.

The threat of Medicare cuts underscores the urgent need for Congress to invest in a more sustainable Medicare physician payment system — the only Medicare payment system lacking an annual inflationary update.

Many other health systems and payment schedules base their payment rates on the Medicare physician fee schedule, including TRICARE, state Medicaid agencies, and other insurers, so it's important that Medicare rates accurately reflect the way physicians serve their patients and communities.

AAFP ASKS CMS TO IMPROVE ACCESS TO CARE FOR MEDICAID BENEFICIARIES

Why it matters: CMS recently released two major proposed regulations aimed at improving access to care for Medicaid beneficiaries. They include several major proposals aimed at improving Medicaid beneficiaries' access to, and physicians' payment for, primary care services—

including implementing appointment wait-time standards and strengthening the transparency of payment rates.

AAFP TELLS CONGRESS ABOUT CHALLENGES WITH MACRA

Why it matters: The House Energy and Commerce Subcommittee held a hearing titled "MACRA Checkup: Assessing Implementation and Challenges that Remain for Patients and Doctors," The Medicare Access and CHIP Reauthorization Act sought to create incentives in Medicare to provide seniors with better-quality care rather than just greater volume of care. However, MACRA has left most Part B clinicians in a state of financial insecurity as Medicare payment rates have failed to keep pace with practice costs amid a dearth of value-based payment model options. The AAFP has long supported the transition to value-based payment through alternative payment models for family physicians ready to move away from fee-for-service toward payment policies that promote and finance comprehensive, continuous, coordinated primary care.

FAMILY PHYSICIANS URGE CONGRESS TO SUPPORT G2211 ADD-ON CODE

Why it matters: In the 2024 Medicare physician fee schedule (MPFS), the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services proposed to fully implement the G2211 add-on code, which accounts for the complexity of managing multiple acute and chronic conditions, providing preventive care across the lifespan, coordinating care across a team of clinicians, and addressing behavioral health and unmet social needs.

In the short-term, G2211 is an incremental step toward more appropriately valuing and paying for

primary care, which will help support physicians, their practices, and their relationship with their patients. In the long-term, it will bolster the primary care workforce and protect patients' access to timely care.

IPPS FINAL RULE IS AN ADVOCACY WIN FOR FAMILY PHYSICIANS

Why it matters: This month, CMS released the final FY2024 Hospital Inpatient Prospective Payment System (IPPS) final rule. AAFP provided feedback on the proposed rule in a joint letter with the Council of Academic Family Medicine in June.

The IPPS rule will enable family medicine residents to train in and provide quality care in rural communities. Family physicians are an essential source of emergency care in rural areas and are uniquely suited to work in rural emergency hospitals (REHs). Multiple studies have demonstrated that, while many family physicians provide emergency care in urban and suburban communities, rural family physicians often work in emergency departments.

AAFP REAFFIRMS WORKFORCE PRIORITIES IN NEW JOINT LETTER

Why it matters: The primary care physician shortage is a complex issue affected by growing demand, a history of under investment in primary care, an aging physician workforce, and economic pressures on the rural health system.

For physicians—in communities both urban and rural, in hospitals, clinics and independent practices—a workforce shortage contributes to burnout, inability to take on new patients, shortened visit times, financial challenges, and increased administrative burden.

AAFP SUPPORTS INCREASED ACCESS TO PREP

Why it matters: The AAFP wrote to Congress expressing support for the PrEP Access and Coverage Act, which would increase access to pre-exposure prophylaxis for HIV by ensuring these medications are fully covered by health insurance.


This legislation would also prohibit prior authorization requirements for HIV prevention drugs, support educational public health campaigns on HIV prevention, and establish grants for states, community-based organizations, community health centers, and others to provide PrEP and PEP services to people who are uninsured.

AAFP RESPONDS TO FTC RULE ON PATIENT PRIVACY

Why it matters: Confidentiality and privacy are key elements of the patient-physician relationship and particularly important in family medicine. Only in a setting of trust can a patient share the private feelings and personal history that enable the physician to best treat them. The AAFP has long supported policies that guarantee health information is protected while working to improve patients' access to their data, as well as the ability to share patients' health information across the care team.

IMMUNIZATIONS MUST BE PART OF EVERY BACK-TO-SCHOOL CHECKLIST

Why it matters: The best way to prevent getting seriously ill, being hospitalized, or even dying from an infectious disease is to get immunized. This includes flu vaccines, COVID-19 bivalent vaccines, and other childhood immunizations, as recommended by



INCOMING PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Colleagues,

As the 77th President of the Virginia Academy of Family Physicians, it is my privilege to welcome you to Virginia Beach for this year's Annual Meeting. Thanks to our wonderful Academy staff and the Continuing Medical Education (CME) Committee led by Mitch Miller, MD, this weekend at the beach offers high quality CME and opportunities to network with family physicians from across the state. I hope the knowledge you gain from the meeting's renowned speakers and your colleagues will help you provide the best medical care to your patients and efficiently manage your practice. This year marks the 75th anniversary of the Academy, and this meeting celebrates the Academy's accomplishments in advancing the specialty of Family Medicine in Virginia.

I believe that Family Medicine is the most rewarding specialty in the medical profession. My experiences growing up, working, and volunteering in communities that are medically underserved exposed me to the devastating health consequences associated with reduced access to medical care and the importance of health promotion and disease prevention. Family Medicine is the specialty that is on the front lines providing continuing comprehensive health care for all members of the family across the lifespan and within their communities. Also, Family Medicine acknowledges the intersection of the biological, clinical, and behavioral sciences in health care, understands how they contribute to disease, and works with other health care team members and community partners to address these influences on health. The specialty of Family Medicine felt like a natural "fit" for me, and I am grateful for the career opportunities the specialty has afforded me so far. Upon finishing residency, I served as the founding physician and clinical lead at a Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) in Charlottesville for four years. After establishing the practice, guiding it to achieve the National Committee for Quality Assurance Patient-Centered Medical Home (PCMH) designation, and serving as a preceptor for medical student and resident clinical rotations, my desire to become more involved with teaching and research led me to Virginia Commonwealth University (VCU) School of Medicine where I currently serve as an assistant professor in the Department of Family Medicine and Population Health, director of the M3 Family Medicine clerkship and M4 Family Medicine Acting Internship, and attending physician at the VCU Health Hayes E. Willis Health Center. My membership in the VAFP has been pivotal to my development as a person, a clinician educator, and an advocate for patients, colleagues, learners, and the specialty. As a medical student member of the Academy, I met many smart, talented, and dedicated family physicians who shared their passion for their work with me and Academy leaders who encouraged me to become involved in the VAFP by serving on the Resident, Student, and Faculty committee. Committee service eventually led to my service on the VAFP Board as a Resident Director for three years and a Director, Committee Co-chair, and Officer over the past five

years. I am humbled to now serve as President of the Academy.

These programs included the annual Scholarly Symposium; workshops, panels, and social gatherings at the Academy's Winter Meeting; and the re-introduction of the Choose Virginia event where over 45 Virginia medical students and over 25 faculty and residents from nine Family Medicine programs across the Commonwealth gathered to host procedural sessions and a residency fair. The committee will continue to explore

opportunities to enhance the VAFP's engagement with medical students and residents. I encourage members to volunteer as a preceptor for medical students and to serve as a mentor to medical students and residents so learners can see the vast career opportunities the specialty offers and how they can tailor their practice to meet their professional goals and the needs of their patients. The VAFP has been working with clerkship directors at Virginia's medical schools to enhance preceptor recruitment for clinical rotations and will continue to support this endeavor. Also, the VAFP will host a Residency Training Summit for Virginia's Family Medicine residency programs during this year's Annual Meeting to support residency training in the state.

I am excited to welcome the new officers and directors to the VAFP Board - Timothy Yu, MD as President-Elect, Robin Anderson, MD as First Vice President, Alison Huffstetler, MD as Secretary, and Linwood Joyner, MD, Robert Newman, MD, and Matthew Paine, MD as Directors. Also, I am pleased to welcome the returning members of the Board of Directors. Many thanks to Macy Rupprecht, MD and Emily Young, MD for their service as Director the past three years, Kent Willyard, MD for serving a full eight-year term in Virginia's AAFP delegation, outgoing President David Gregory, MD for his remarkable leadership over the past year, and the VAFP's talented and dedicated staff who contribute to the year-after-year success of the Academy - Mary Lindsay White, Matt Schulte, Cheryl Modesto, Kristi Reynolds, and Kristie Duncan. Together, the VAFP officers, directors, committee chairs, advisors, and staff will guide the Academy to represent the interests of all Virginia family physicians.

It is my honor to serve as your President, and thank you for placing your trust in me and the Board to make Virginia the best place for people to receive healthcare and for family physicians to practice medicine.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Hunter Jamerson, JD, MBA, General Counsel & Legislative Consultant

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians enjoyed another successful year in its government relations activities on behalf of family physicians. VAFP's successes, and prospective challenges, are laid out below. More legislative action is likely this summer as the Commonwealth's budget remains in limbo. House and Senate negotiations recently broke off and may soon necessitate a special session to resolve the impasse. VAFP remains engaged in the budget conference advocating for appropriate reimbursement for the practice of family medicine.

General Assembly Wrap-Up

The Virginia General Assembly adjourned sine die in March. The most significant highlight this year was VAFP's successful defense of the scope of practice of medicine. A now annual effort by nurse practitioners to eliminate minimum competency standards for autonomous practice was defeated in the House Health, Welfare, and Institutions Committee. This threat grows in risk each year, as now the Youngkin Administration is supportive of the nurse practitioners' position citing health workforce shortages. VAFP remains stalwart in its defense of these important public safety standards.

The Senate budget contains an increase to raise primary care reimbursement codes to 80% of Medicare. While the House budget does not contemplate a reimbursement rate increase, VAFP is advocating that the final budget take the Senate position. This negotiation will play out over the next month.

VAFP succeeded again in preventing malpractice cap reform legislation this year. Likewise, VAFP continued to successfully advocate for implementation of electronic prior authorization systems across payors in Virginia.

Looking Forward to 2024

VAFP anticipates a renewed push in the 2024 General

Assembly by mid-level providers seeking independent practice. Nurse practitioners, physician assistants, associate physicians, chiropractors, and pharmacists continue annual efforts to expand their statutory scope of practice. VAFP remains vigilant in resisting any effort to infringe on the scope of practice of medicine. The VAFP Legislative Committee is actively considering proactive legislation to manage some of these scope of practice challenges.

VAFP will also continue its focus on reducing barriers to practice, increasing provider reimbursement, and supporting graduate medical education and physician retention. These initiatives are bolstered by what continues to be a strong fiscal situation in the Commonwealth and may gain some tailwinds through changing Committee chair assignments in the General Assembly.

Impact of November 2023 Elections

VAFP is watching closely for electoral impacts changing the center of power in the Virginia General Assembly. As much as 40% of the 2024 General Assembly are likely to be new faces. Presently, Republicans hold a 52-48 majority in the House while Democrats hold a 22-18 majority in the Senate. Redistricting has brought new electoral maps to Virginia and, at least on paper, suggests a change of control is possible in either or both chambers. Control of each chamber dictates the committee chair assignments which has an outsized influence on legislative prospects. Also, control of both chambers dictates the power dynamics between the General Assembly and Governor Youngkin as he enters the second half of his administration. The FamDOC PAC will be active, on a bi-partisan basis, in supporting members of the General Assembly who support family medicine.

Thank you to the VAFP Legislative Committee led by Chair Jesus Lizarzaburu, MD and the very active members of the committee for their commitment to weekly meetings during the session each year and their engagement with their respective Senators and Delegates on important issues that impact the daily practice of family medicine in the Commonwealth.

They play an important role in the Academy's legislative and advocacy processes.

The VAFP maintains a list of "Key Contacts" each year to readily reach out to during legislative sessions for their input on issues. It is very important for family physicians to have personal relationships with legislators so the family physician becomes that legislators trusted source of information as it relates to how they vote on health-related bills.

CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians continues its tradition of offering first class, affordable continuing medical education conferences for Academy members.

Each year, the Academy sponsors two major CME activities. The Winter Family Medicine Weekend is held over four days in the winter months of January or February annually. The 2023 winter event was back as a full in-person event and was held over the dates of January 26-29 at Wintergreen Resort. It drew over 200 family physicians, residents, medical students, and other health care professionals and 36 exhibiting organizations supported the meeting. New this year, the Academy offered a one-time complimentary registration to all AAFP member recent graduates that were less than 5 years out of residency. Twelve of our new physician members took advantage of this outstanding opportunity.

The Academy's Annual Meeting & Exposition is held each summer in mid-July or early August. This year's Annual Meeting is scheduled for July 13-16 at the Marriott Oceanfront in Virginia Beach. The meeting will be comprised of two full days and two half days of general CME sessions and workshops worth up to over 20 credits of live AAFP Prescribed CME. Sessions will be in-person at the Marriott.

During the Annual Meeting in July, the Academy will also be celebrating its 75th anniversary with a chapter inception date of May 25, 1948.

The VAFP sponsored five group learning sessions to assist VAFP members with the completion of their ABFM Family Medicine Certification Process requirements. These sessions drew maximum attendance and continue to be evaluated very highly. Knowledge Self-Assessment (KSA) programs are now always being offered in a hybrid model. The facilitation of the KSAs in a hybrid model has truly been a great member benefit as it allows members to feel as

though they are in person without having to travel if they so choose.

Continued in 2023, the VAFP offered at each major CME event an opportunity to attend a pain management continuing medical education session. Physicians who attend these sessions satisfy the Board of Medicine requirements and the newly instituted MATE act which are federal requirements for continuing education in pain management, proper prescribing of controlled substances, and the diagnosis and management of addiction. The Board requires all prescribers licensed by the Board of Medicine to obtain 2 hours of education in the 24 months prior to their next biennial renewal. The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) released materials in March 2023 related to the new Medication Access and Training Expansion (MATE) Act. The Act requires new or renewing DEA licensees, as of June 27, 2023, to have completed a total of at least eight hours of training on opioid or other substance use disorders and the appropriate treatment of pain.

The Academy also provided members CME opportunities via multiple webinar offerings in the 2022-23 year including COVID-19 Vaccine Recommendations Update, NovaVax and Bivalent COVID-19 Booster Vaccine Update and Monkeypox Overview in partnership with the Department of Health. All were very well received and attended by over 75 VAFP members.

The Academy expresses its deep appreciation to the Chair of the Continuing Medical Education Committee, Mitchell B. Miller, MD, FAAFP, and his committee members Joe Fields-Johnson, DO, Alison Huffstetler, MD, Tamara Spriggs, MD, MPH, Emily Young, DO, MA, MPH, and Tim Yu, MD, FAAFP for their outstanding work in creating superb CME for VAFP members and to Kurtis S. Elward, MD, MPH, FAAFP, Mark H. Greenawald, MD, FAAFP, Tarin Schmidt-Dalton, MD, FAAFP and Mary Beth Sweet, MD, for their exceptional work as Family Medicine Certification session presenters.

MEMBERSHIP

As of May 2023, total VAFP membership stood at 3,111 with Active membership totaling 1,836, resident membership at 376 and student membership at 516. Four additional categories including Life membership totaled 383. The membership numbers are slightly decreased from 2022 but not significantly and an area that VAFP staff is focused on for the remainder of the 2023 membership year.

The VAFP continues to offer multiple member benefits including access to the Daily POEMS, the VAFP Career Center and legal resources for employment contract negotiations, regulatory and administrative issues.

Daily POEMs (Patient Oriented Evidence that Matters) from Essential Evidence Plus provide members with complimentary daily alerts and over 3,000 archived POEMs to help members stay abreast of the latest and most relevant medical literature. Delivered directly to by e-mail every Monday through Friday, Daily POEMs identify the most valid, relevant research that may change the way physicians' practice. Since 1996, POEMs editors review more than 1,200 studies monthly from more than 100 medical journals, presenting only the best and most relevant as POEMs. The acclaimed POEMs process applies specific criteria for validity and relevance to clinical practice. RESIDENTS & STUDENTS

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians Board of Directors has two elected resident representatives and two elected medical student representatives who serve a one-year term on the Board beginning in the fall. Representatives are funded to attend all VAFP Board Meetings as well as the AAFP's National Conference of Family Medicine Residents and Medical Students held annually in July.

The process for election of the Resident Representative is facilitated by each Virginia residency program nominating one resident to run as a candidate. Candidates complete an on-line nomination form, and each Virginia family medicine residency program is entitled to cast two votes for residents nominated for Resident Director on the VAFP Board of Directors. Only one vote may be for the resident from their respective program for the ballot to be valid.

The process for election of the Student Representative is facilitated by each Virginia medical school nominating one student to run as a candidate. Student candidates complete an on-line nomination form, and each medical school must vote for two candidates for the ballot to be valid, of which only one of these votes may go to a student from their school if one is nominated.

The VAFP provides complimentary housing for students and residents to attend the VAFP Winter Family Medicine Weekend held annually at Wintergreen Resort. At the 2023 VAFP Winter Family Medicine Weekend, 11 Family Medicine Residents and 59 medical students were in attendance. Continued from previous years, was a resident panel discussion that offered students the opportunity to ask questions of residents and get a good feel for what it is like to be a family medicine resident. At the conclusion of the research and panel discussion, the residents and students enjoyed a pizza dinner with families and networking opportunities.

The VAFP also supports residents with discounted employment contract review by the VAFP's General Counsel and a Career Center that houses multiple job offerings in the Commonwealth. The VAFP supports the Family Medicine Interest Group's at each of the six Virginia medical schools with \$500.00 in funding to develop programs that promote Family Medicine.

Academy dues are paid by the VAFP for resident members in their first year of residency and all medical student dues are complimentary.

The VAFP Foundation offers a graduating medical student that attends a Virginia Residency Program a \$1,500 scholarship as well as a Virginia PGY-3 Graduating Resident a \$2,000 scholarship that chooses to practice in an underserved area of Virginia. The Foundation awarded its first scholarship in 2017.

Again, in the fall of 2022, the VAFP hosted a Scholarly Symposium for residents, medical students, and fellows. This one-day event showcased scholarly work in the areas of clinical or population health research, medical education research, literature review, case reports, QI/PI projects, clinical successes, patient stories, or educational projects. Seven residents and eleven students presented research during the virtual event. Concluding the event was the Keynote Address titled *Practice-Based Implementation and De-Implementation to Promote High Value Primary Care* presented by Michelle Rockwell PhD, RD, Assistant Professor Family & Community Medicine, Virginia Tech Carilion School of Medicine. The symposium was highly attended by not only student and resident presenters but other family physicians from across the Commonwealth that were interested in learning about future family physicians' research. The event for 2023 is slated for Saturday, November 4th virtually from 10:00 a.m. – 11:30 p.m.

On May $20^{\rm th}$ the VAFP hosted Choose Virginia 2023 at the Delta Hotels by Marriott Richmond Downtown. This event was first held back in 2009 in partnership with the Virginia Workforce Development Authority and the Virginia Department of Health. In the fall of 2022, VAFP was contacted by some of the Commonwealth's Family Medicine Residency Program Directors to again sponsor and host a Choose Virginia event. Over 45 medical students and over 25 faculty and family medicine residents from nine programs across the Commonwealth were in attendance.

The format for the event included a Welcome session where VAFP President Dave Gregory, MD along with VAFP Resident, Student and Faculty Committee Co-Chairs Denee Moore, MD and Dan McCarter, MD

welcomed the group and discussed with the audience their personal family medicine journey.

FINANCES

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians continues its tradition of operating under sound financial leadership. This effort is led by VAFP Treasurer Charles Frazier, MD, and the members of the VAFP Executive/ Finance Committee. The committee meets each year to develop an operating budget that meets the needs of the Academy yet is very mindful of the fiscal responsibility to the Academy. During the meeting, the committee also reviews the Academy's Financial Reserve Policy and Statement of Cash.

Currently, the VAFP's dues are among the lowest in the country as compared to other AAFP Chapters with an active membership of similar size. In the last 30 plus years, the Academy has only had four dues increases.

Net income for fiscal year 2022 was \$12,040, just slightly over the budgeted projection. The VAFP ended fiscal year 2022 with Net Assets of just over \$2,188,000.

The VAFP Well-being Committee, co-chaired by VAFP Past Presidents Mark Greenawald, MD and Neeta Goel, MD met via zoom over the course of the last year specifically addressing issues that were derived from the all-member survey that was distributed in the spring of 2023.

The results of the survey are noted below.

Unrestricted Net Assets, end of year

Overview of Responders

98% of the respondents are active practicing physician's vs residents/students.

29% of the respondents are physicians from independently owned practices.

39% of the respondents are physicians that have been in practice > 30 years.

72% of the respondents practice full-time.

Professional Barriers (3 highest weighted averages)

- 1. EMR charting 4.09
- 2. EMR inbox 3.92
- 3. Staff Shortages 3.49

Personal Barriers (3 highest weighted averages)

- 1. Feeling the need to "do it all" 3.48
- 2. Work/Life balance 3.42
- 3. Ability/time to Exercise 3.05

In response, the committee made suggestions to the VAFP CME Committee to include in its offerings during the annual meeting, member sessions to combat the number one issue that the survey exposed, the electronic health record (EHR).
