I want to highlight the many achievements of the Academy and its members as we worked together to move Family Medicine forward in Virginia.

The VAFP continued to offer well attended and highly rated CME events for members. Thank you to the CME committee, led by Mitch Miller, MD, and the Academy staff for your hard

work and dedication to ensuring these events are a success.

The 2024 Virginia General Assembly provided the Academy with an opportunity to engage with elected officials and promote legislation to streamline patient care, maintain patient safety, enhance practice sustainability, and grow the state's Family Medicine physician workforce. Thank you to the Legislative Committee, led by Jesus Lizarzaburu, MD and Mark Watts, MD, General Counsel Hunter Jamerson, JD, Key Contacts, and members who served as Family Physician of the Day at the General Assembly for your great advocacy work.

Several successful resident and student events were held. These included the Scholarly Symposium which gave Family Medicine residents and students the opportunity to present scholarly work to their peers and Academy members, resident- and student-focused educational sessions at the Academy's Winter meeting, and Choose Virginia which gave students an opportunity to learn about Virginia's Family Medicine residency programs and network with faculty and residents from those programs. Thank you to the Resident, Student, and Faculty Committee members, fellow co-chair Dan McCarter, MD, and the VAFP staff for your tremendous efforts and commitment to supporting our state's Family Medicine residents and students. Also, the Academy regularly convened Virginia's Family Medicine residency program directors and associate program directors to facilitate networking and learn how the VAFP can assist them with educating the next generation of family physicians. Thank you to those who participated in the meetings and partnered with the Academy to strengthen Family Medicine residency training in the state.

Wellness is key to maintaining physician joy in practice and sustaining the Family Medicine physician workforce. The VAFP launched a new column in the Academy's spring magazine called the "VAFP Well-being Corner" which highlights potential challenges to physician well-being and provides examples of how physicians can improve their response to these situations. Thank you to the Well-being Committee, led by Neeta Goel, MD and Mark Greenawald, MD, for the incredible work you've done to help members achieve wellness.

To promote practice innovation and transformation, the VAFP piloted the Family Medicine Practice
Transformation Grant Initiative. This grant is available to attending and resident physician members to support a project within their practice that enhances the patient experience or supports the delivery of the highest level of care to patients. David Killeen, MD at Neighborhood Health in Alexandria, VA was the winner of the inaugural grant. Dr. Killeen used the grant to expand the prenatal ultrasound services offered at the practice which provided prenatal patients with more complete and timely care.

A number of Academy members were selected for leadership positions at the national level. Allison Zamora, a

recent graduate of Liberty University College of Osteopathic Medicine - Center for Medical and Health Sciences, was elected as Student Chair of the 2024 AAFP National Conference. Tabatha Davis, MD was elected as New Physician constituency co-convener for the 2025 AAFP National Conference of Constituency Leaders (NCCL) and New Physician Alternate Delegate to the 2024 AAFP Congress of Delegates. Heba Elzawahry, MD was appointed to serve on the reference committee for Organization and Finance for the 2024 NCCL and Richard (Rich) Uribe, MD was appointed to serve on the reference committee for Education for the 2024 NCCL. One Academy member was recognized at the national level for significant contributions to advance community health. Fern Hauck, MD, MS, received the 2024 AAFP Public Health Award for her care of refugee populations in the greater Charlottesville community. Congratulations to all!

As my term as President concludes, I would like to thank the amazing VAFP officers and directors for their service to the organization. Also, thank you to the wonderful and talented VAFP staff for making the Academy a thriving organization. Together, we guided the Academy to represent the interests of Virginia's family physicians. Finally, thank you to VAFP members for giving me the opportunity to lead this great organization. It has been a pleasure to serve Academy members, Virginia's family physicians and patients across the state. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE HUNTER JAMERSON, JD, MBA, GENERAL COUNSEL & LEGISLATIVE CONSULTANT

The VAFP Legislative Committee Co-Chaired by Jesus Lizarzaburu, MD and Mark Watts, MD, VAFP Legislative Consultant and General Counsel Hunter Jamerson, JD and family physician members of the committee were extremely busy working to advocate on behalf of family medicine in Virginia. The committee meets virtually weekly during the General Assembly and on an as needed basis meets virtually or communicates via list serv outside of the General Assembly. This group is very important to the mission of the VAFP in representing you in the legislative arena to ensure that primary care and specifically issues impacting your daily practice of family medicine are monitored and addressed.

2024 Annual General Assembly Report

The VAFP completed another successful General Assembly session, advocating for the interests of family medicine. This session presented significant challenges in both scope, reimbursement, and professional defense. Through VAFP's advocacy, in coordination with our colleagues in the House of Medicine, the VAFP secured several major victories.

This session also presented an opportunity to introduce the priorities of family medicine to a new group of legislators. More than 60% of the General Assembly was new this year. As a result, VAFP spent a significant amount of time educating legislators who were learning about the challenges facing family medicine for the first time. VAFP sponsored a successful Advocacy Day allowing members to directly connect with their legislators in order to provide a primary resource for the issues facing family physicians practicing on the front lines.

VAFP's 2024 General Assembly Session victories included:

Medical Malpractice

Senator Stanley's SB 493 proposed to eliminate the cap on the recovery in actions against health care providers for medical malpractice where the act or acts of malpractice occurred, on or after July 1, 2024, against a patient aged 10 or younger. After advancing from the Courts Committee on a vote of 8-4 with 3 abstentions, VAFP, in coordination with other stakeholders, was able to defeat the bill on a vote of 6-9 in the Senate Committee on Finance. Threats to the Med-Mal cap remain, however, so an inter-session work group will meet to discuss concerns about the Med-Mal cap and map out possible future reforms.

Nurse Practitioner Autonomous Practice

Delegate Tran's HB 971 proposed to reduce from 5 years to 2 years the post-graduate pathway to autonomous practice for nurse practitioners. It became clear that the votes were not present in either chamber to support a 2 year pathway; however, it was equally clear the votes were not present to hold the current 5 year standard. After substantial negotiations, consensus was reached to reset the pathway to 3 years (the high end of the national average) with the understanding that the issue will not be raised again for the foreseeable future. To help ensure the longevity of this "deal," a study will be conducted by Department of Health Professions with a report due prior to the 2028 General Assembly detailing how many nurse practitioners sought autonomy, where they chose to practice, and how many disciplinary claims arose against autonomous nurse practitioners.

Joint Boards of Medicine and Nursing

Senator Boysko's SB 351 sought to eliminate the Joint Boards of Medicine and Nursing in favor of nurse

practitioners being solely regulated by the Board of Nursing. Presently, nurse practitioners are regulated by physicians and nurses comprising the Joint Boards. In conjunction with other stakeholders, VAFP was able to defeat this bill in the Health Professions subcommittee. The bill failed for lack of a second to the motion to recommend reporting the bill.

Administrative Burdens

Senator Favola's SB 425 significantly improves carrier business practices. The bill prohibits a carrier from imposing any retroactive denial of a previously paid claim or in any other way seeking recovery or refund of a previously paid claim unless the carrier specifies in writing the specific claim or claims for which the retroactive denial is to be imposed or the recovery or refund is sought, the carrier has provided a written explanation of why the claim is being retroactively adjusted. The bill provides that the time limit for a retroactive denial is 12 months; however, a provider and a carrier may agree in writing that recoupment of overpayments by withholding or offsetting against future payments may occur after such 12 month-limit. The bill requires carriers, beginning no later than July 1, 2025, to make available an electronic means for providers to determine whether an enrollee is covered by a health plan that is subject to the State Corporation Commission's jurisdiction. The Governor signed this bill into law.

Prior Authorization

Senator Favola's SB 98 enshrines certain protections for prior authorization approvals. SB 98 requires that any provider contract between a carrier and a participating health care provider contain specific provisions that require that if a prior authorization request is approved and services and supplies have been scheduled, provided, or delivered to the patient consistent with the authorization, the carrier shall not revoke, limit, condition, modify, or restrict that authorization unless (i) there is evidence that the authorization was obtained based on fraud or misrepresentation; (ii) final actions by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration, other regulatory agencies, or the manufacturer remove the drug from the market, limit its use in a manner that affects the authorization, or communicate a patient safety issue that would affect the authorization alone or in combination with other authorizations; (iii) a combination of drugs prescribed would cause a drug interaction; or (iv) a generic or biosimilar is added to the prescription drug formulary. The Governor signed this bill into law.

Looking Ahead

VAFP will continue its zealous advocacy in the General Assembly to support the priorities of family medicine. The VAFP Legislative Committee is presently focused on continued defense of scope of practice, implementation of administrative burden reforms, support for family medicine residency programs, and expanding opportunities for reimbursement in both the public and private payor space. VAFP is especially focused on continuing to work toward Medicare – Medicaid payment parity. In a world of finite resources and competing priorities, your support is more important than ever. 2024 Advocacy Day

On Thursday, January 18, 2024, VAFP members participated in the annual VAFP Advocacy Day at the Virginia General Assembly. The day started with breakfast and a briefing on the issues of interest from VAFP Legislative Consultant Hunter Jamerson, JD. Following breakfast and briefing, the group made their way to the newly opened General Assembly building where they had in person meetings with their respective Senators and Delegates, lobbying on issues pertinent to the daily practice of family medicine and attended health sub-committee meetings in both the Senate and the House. Many of the legislators VAFP members met with during the day were newly elected to the General Assembly which was a great avenue for developing relationships and educating on the importance of primary care in the

Commonwealth.

Issues that the family physician, family medicine resident and medical student participants focused on in their discussion with legislators and their aides included the medical malpractice cap, prior authorization, scope of practice, incentives for mental health services, covenants not to compete, health insurance coverages and the importance of the primary care workforce in Virginia. On the state budget front, participants emphasized the importance of the passage of funds to increase the Medicaid reimbursement in primary care and funds for loan repayment to family physicians that choose to practice in a health professions shortage area of the Commonwealth.

Family Physician of the Day Program

Again in 2024, the VAFP staffed the medical station in the General Assembly Building daily from 9:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. VAFP members volunteer to work the clinic each day of the legislative session. It is a great way to meet your legislator and continue to have family medicine at the forefront in the minds of our lawmakers.

CONTINUING MEDICAL EDUCATION

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians continues its tradition of offering first class, affordable continuing medical education conferences for Academy members. The Academy is pleased to report that the 2023-2024 year saw a rebound for attendance at our CME events that mirrors the pre-COVID years. The VAFP CME Committee Chaired by Mitchell Miller, MD, continually works on behalf of family physicians to create events that focus on the most up to date topics that are pertinent to the daily practice of family medicine and national/state educational requirements.

Each year, the Academy sponsors two major CME activities. The Winter Family Medicine Weekend is held over four days in the month of January. The 2024 winter event was held over the dates of January 25-28 at Wintergreen Resort. It drew over 200 family physicians, residents, medical students, and other health care professionals and 38 exhibiting organizations supported the meeting. The Academy continues to offer a one-time complimentary registration to all AAFP member recent graduates that were less than 5 years out of residency. Thirteen of our new physician members took advantage of this outstanding opportunity.

The Academy's Annual Meeting & Exposition is held each summer in mid-July or early August. This year's Annual Meeting is scheduled for July 18-21 at The Williamsburg Lodge. The meeting will be comprised of two full days and two half days of general CME sessions and workshops worth up to over 20 credits of live AAFP Prescribed CME. Sessions will be in-person at the Lodge. In 2024, the Academy is offering the VAFP Journal Club as a new session that satisfies the ABFM certification requirements. A special thank you to VAFP Past President and Treasurer Charles Frazier, MD for facilitating this inaugural session.

In addition to the VAFP Journal Club, the VAFP also sponsored five Knowledge Self-Assessment (KSA) programs to assist VAFP members with the completion of their ABFM Family Medicine certification requirements. These sessions drew maximum attendance and continue to be evaluated very highly. The facilitation of the KSA's in a hybrid model has truly been a great member benefit as it allows members to feel as though they are in person without having to travel if they so choose.

Continuing in 2024, the VAFP offered at each major CME event an opportunity to attend sessions focused on the management of pain and opioid prescribing that serves to satisfy the MATE act which is a federal requirement for continuing education in pain management, proper prescribing of controlled substances, and the diagnosis and management of addiction. The Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) released materials in 2023 related to the new Medication Access and Training Expansion (MATE) Act. The Act requires new or renewing DEA licensees, to have completed a total of at least eight hours of training on opioid or other substance use disorders and the appropriate treatment of pain.

The Academy partnered with the American Academy of Pediatrics (VA-AAP) and the Virginia Mental Health Access Program (VMAP) on the provision of pediatric mental health education to include live sessions on helping families get the treatment their children need and a webinar on the impact of the internet on youth mental health.

The Academy expresses its deep appreciation to the Chair of the Continuing Medical Education Committee for their outstanding work in creating superb CME for VAFP members and to Kurtis S. Elward, MD, MPH, FAAFP, Mark H. Greenawald, MD, FAAFP, Tarin Schmidt-Dalton, MD, FAAFP, Mary Beth Sweet, MD, and Charles Frazier, MD, FAAFP for their exceptional work as Family Medicine Certification session presenters.

MEMBERSHIP

As of May 2023, total VAFP membership stood at 3,076 with Active membership totaling 1,810, resident membership at 346 and student membership at 509. Four additional categories including Life membership totaled 411. The membership numbers are slightly decreased from 2023 and an area that the VAFP staff is focused on for the remainder of the 2024 membership year. In evaluating the drop in active membership, the New Physician category (graduation from residency within seven years) and those members that are transitioning from the Active Member to Life Member category show the largest decrease. Additionally, our resident members decreased slightly and an area that staff will work with program coordinators to strive for 100% resident membership in the VAFP.

The VAFP continues to offer multiple member benefits including access to the Daily POEMS, the VAFP Career Center and legal resources for employment contract negotiations, regulatory and administrative issues.

Daily POEMs (Patient Oriented Evidence that Matters) from Essential Evidence Plus provide members with complimentary daily alerts and over 3,000 archived POEMs to help members stay abreast of the latest and most relevant medical literature. Delivered directly to by e-mail every Monday through Friday, Daily POEMs identify the most valid, relevant research that may change the way physicians practice. Since 1996, POEMs editors review more than 1,200 studies monthly from more than 100 medical journals, presenting only the best and most relevant as POEMs. The acclaimed POEMs process applies specific criteria for validity and relevance to clinical practice. This service was developed in 2016 by the VAFP's General Counsel K. Marshall Cook, JD and is invaluable to those physicians that are beginning their practice of family medicine after residency completion or those members that are changing employers or hiring partner physicians.



RESIDENT, STUDENT & FACULTY

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians puts great focus on our resident and student members and the faculty at the residency programs and medical schools that support the training of these future family physicians.

Resident and Student Leadership

VAFP resident and student members can participate in multiple leadership positions at the state level on the VAFP Board of Directors, as members of VAFP committees and as Delegate to the AAFP National Conference representing Virginia. On the national level, as members of AAFP commissions and other various representatives to partner AAFP organizations. On the VAFP Board, resident and medical student representatives serve a one-year term beginning in the fall of each year. Representatives are funded to attend all VAFP Board Meetings as well as the AAFP's National Conference of Family Medicine Residents and Medical Students held annually in July/August.

Resident and Student Benefits

Academy dues are paid by the VAFP for resident members in their first year of residency and all four years of medical student dues are complimentary.

In addition to membership dues benefits, the VAFP provides complimentary housing for students and residents to attend the VAFP Winter Family Medicine Weekend held annually at Wintergreen Resort. At the 2024 VAFP Winter Family Medicine Weekend, 11 Family Medicine Residents and 36 medical students were in attendance. Continued from previous years, was a resident panel discussion that offered students the opportunity to ask questions of residents related to "What It's Like to be a FM Resident?". At the conclusion of the panel discussion, the residents and students enjoyed a complimentary networking dinner.

The VAFP also supports residents with discounted employment contract review by the VAFP's General Counsel and a Career Center that houses multiple job offerings in the Commonwealth. The VAFP supports the Family Medicine Interest Group's at each of the six Virginia medical schools with \$500.00 in funding to develop programs that promote Family Medicine.

Choose VA Scholarships

The VAFP Foundation offers a medical student scholarship and a resident scholarship for assistance with education loan repayment. Many medical students and family medicine residents in Virginia have expressed an interest in staying in the Commonwealth after their graduation to complete a family medicine residency or to practice in a medically underserved area. The VAFP Foundation receives donations from generous members to support this effort to keep our own. A \$2,500 scholarship is available for a graduating medical student that attends a Virginia Residency Program a \$3,500 scholarship is available for a Virginia PGY-3 Graduating Resident that chooses to practice in an underserved area of Virginia. The Foundation awarded its first scholarships in 2017.

In the fall of 2023, the VAFP hosted a Scholarly Symposium for residents, medical students, and fellows. This one-day event showcased scholarly work in the areas of clinical or population health research, medical education research, literature review, case reports, QI/PI projects, clinical successes, patient stories, or educational projects. Over 40 student, resident and family physician members attended the virtual conference which was approved for 2.00 AAFP Prescribed CME credits. The event for 2024 is slated for Saturday, November 2nd from 10:00 a.m. – 11:30 a.m.

Choose VA

On May 4th the VAFP hosted Choose Virginia 2024 at the Virginia Crossings Hotel & Conference Center in Glen Allen, Virginia. This event was first held back in 2009 in partnership with the Virginia Workforce Development Authority and the Virginia Department of Health.

Over 55 medical students representing all six medical schools and over 40 faculty and family medicine residents from eleven programs across the Commonwealth were in attendance.

Beginning in July 2023, Virginia Family Medicine Residency Program leadership faculty met on a quarterly basis to share ideas and learn from each other on ways to continue to enhance the training of our future family physicians.

FINANCES

The Virginia Academy of Family Physicians continues its tradition of operating under sound financial leadership. This effort is led by VAFP Treasurer Charles Frazier, MD, and the members of the VAFP Executive/Finance Committee. The committee meets each year to develop an operating budget that meets the needs of the Academy yet is very mindful of the fiscal responsibility to the Academy. During the meeting, the committee also reviews the Academy's Financial Reserve Policy and Statement of Cash.

Currently, the VAFP's dues are among the lowest in the country as compared to other AAFP Chapters with an active membership of similar size. In the last 30 plus years, the Academy has only had four dues increases.

Net income for fiscal year 2023 was \$71,667, which exceeded the budgeted projections by just over \$50,000. The VAFP ended fiscal year 2023 with Net Assets of just over \$2,260,000.
